I wish all students the very best with the upcoming exams.











## MS LEANNE WINFIELD, WELLBEING AND PATHWAYS

In the Year 10 Careers and Mentoring Program, students have completed two weeks of the VicRoads Road Smart Program. This program educates our young drivers regarding road safety. In the second week students had the opportunity to participate in the 'In Car Off Road component' of the program which provides students with practical experience driving in the safety of the Sandown Racecourse.



## Coming soon: Schools TV

School TV is a wellbeing platform featuring Dr Micheal Carr-Gregg and other wellbeing experts. It addresses modern day realities faced by schools, as well as students and parents who increasingly need clear, relevant and fact-based information around raising safe, happy and resilient young people.

School TV provides schools with topic based multimedia content from some of Australia's leading experts. It is designed to integrate seamlessly with any school website and will be incorporated into Compass.

## Reminders for parents, firstly about our First Aid procedure:

When a student is ill at school the procedure to follow at Bentleigh Secondary College is:

- 1. During recess or lunchtime, report to your Head of Year Level (HOYL) who will then make a decision on the best course of action. HOYL will contact parents.
- 2. During class time or between classes, report to your teacher first. You may then be referred to First Aid, who will contact parents if needed.

Student diaries must be signed by HOYL or class teacher before any visit to First Aid. Students are **not to call parents** to collect them before the above procedure has been followed.

## Secondly, as the weather starts to warm up a reminder about our Sun Smart Policy.

Sun safety is a shared responsibility and staff, parents and students are encouraged to implement a combination of sun protection measures whenever UV levels reach 3 and above (typically from mid-August to the end of April in Victoria). Information about the daily local sun protection times is available via the free SunSmart app, at sunsmart. com.au or bom.gov.au.

Bentleigh Secondary College has the following measures in place to help reduce the risk of excessive UV sun exposure for staff and students: shade, sun protective uniform/clothing and sunscreen. ## STEAM EUROPE TOUR 2019

2019 saw the second Europe/STEAM tour that ran from September 18 - 30, 2019. Nine students from Year 10 and 11 embarked on a journey of scientific and historical discovery in England, France and Belgium. The trip started off in beautiful Melbourne where all of the students arrived ready to tackle an enjoyable but exhaustive journey only to discover that the outbound flight had a delay and wasn't scheduled to leave until the morning of Sep 19, which meant that we would have missed our connecting flight and thus the trip would be one day short overall. Undeterred we all headed off with a positive mindset from Melbourne and ended up with a short stay in Bangkok on our way to Europe. The big day finally arrived and after what seemed like an eternity we touched down in Paris, France. Given the change in schedule all the students decided that they would forgo Versailles and spend our day touring Paris. We met our wonderful tour guide, Alejandra and she was able to show us all the important sites in Paris, including the Louvre, Arc de Triomphe, Hôtel National des Invalides and of course the Eiffel Tower, the beautiful landmark that defines the Parisian skyline which made for a thoroughly enjoyable day, even if we were all still suffering a little jetlag.

We were taken to a town approximately 120kms north of Paris called Amiens (the Somme area of France) where we put our feet up and finally got a chance to get some well-deserved rest. The following morning, we were met with our new guide, Geert, an Accountant with an extensive knowledge of the history of the region and we proceeded to tour the countryside and visit sites that were of deep historical interest to Australia and those who gave their life for our freedom. Adelaide Cemetery in Villers-Bretonneux, was one of those sites and Geert described how land was given to the Commonwealth of Australia in perpetuity to lay those diggers in their final resting spot from World War I. Everyone was in silence as we reflected on the hundred's of engraved tombstones from those who gave their lives but also for those who were an unknown soldier "known only onto God" was a poignant reminder that there were many who to this day remain unidentified, but still remembered. From Adelaide Cemetery we then visited Victoria School, again in Villers-Britonneux, that was rebuilt by Australian soldiers after it was destroyed in 1918. At the site was the Musée Franco Australien that included many war items graciously donated by family members of those who had fallen in war. From here we were then off to Sir John Monash Centre, a huge museum that commemorates those who served on the Western Front during World War I. Interactive displays and amazing stories made for some very solemn reflections during our visit with the severity of war evident in every display, footage and item on display. That afternoon we crossed over into Belgium visiting other historical sites of interest including Pozieres Military Cemetery and Memorial, Bullecourt Sigger, and Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery. That night we were witness to Menin Gate Memorial Ceremony, a memorial to the unknown soldiers of World War I and every evening at 8:00 pm the road is blocked off and the Last Post ceremony is carried out.

Following a night of rest, we were all on the Eurostar heading for London, where we had checked into our accommodation and readied ourselves for our adventures in London. Seeing the Royal Institution and partaking in the L'Oreal Young Scientist Program where all students are budding forensic scientists solving important crimes. After our forensics work we were off to New London Architecture where we were able to view the whole city of London and how buildings are designed and built to suit the architecture of the City of London. Our tour of London concluded in the next few days with visits to Greenwich exploring the Prime Meridian, Bletchley Park where Allied forces worked to crack the Nazi codes, tours of the majestic St. Paul's Cathedral and Tower of London. Some very busy days indeed which was balanced with the spectacular "Wicked" West End Show at the famous Apollo Victoria Theatre. Westminster Abbey followed by a visit to Hampton Court Palace rounded out some of the sites that London had to offer us all. After all our massive adventures and experiences, we boarded our flights for the long trip back home to Melbourne safe and sound. The experiences, friendships, sites and sounds that we experienced as a group are memories that will be cherished for a long time to come.



















































## SOLAR CAR CHALLENGE


## Sreyoshi Dutta, Year 9.3 Student






## STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS



### **BayCISS Annual Giving Appeal**

BayCISS is a not for profit organisation located at 12 Katoomba Street, Hampton East providing services to vulnerable and disadvantaged members of our community.

In the lead up to our summer break period we distribute over 170 food and gift hampers to low income and vulnerable families within our community. Your assistance with this distribution will assist us in our work and the ability to bring some happiness to others.

BayCISS currently offer the following services:

- Provision of Emergency Relief including food vouchers, food parcels, phone cards and met tickets;
- Budget Advice and assistance with bill payments at times of crisis;
- A legal advice service;
- Taxation advice and assistance with completion of taxation returns to low income clients;
- No Interest Loans Scheme;
- A family counselling service which provides low cost counselling to families in need;
- Education Support program which provides assistance with costs of camps, excursions and other
  activities that are offered to children. The program enables children whose parents are unable to
  afford these activities to participate fully in all aspects of school;
- Occasional Child Care and playgroups at Castlefield Community Centre.

In the past financial year, we have:

- Provided emergency relief in the form of food vouchers and food parcels to 5406 community members
- Provided 87 families with assistance to pay utilities bills
- Advocated for 500 families with utilities companies and other agencies.
- Assisted 289 children to access educational opportunities providing funding of almost \$60,000 to 22 different schools.
- Provided tax advice, legal advice or family counselling to 250 families and individuals.

We rely on 80 volunteers who are trained as Community Information Workers.

All donations to BayCISS - be they financial or goods - go directly to assist low income and vulnerable members of our community. Any assistance with our Annual Giving Appeal will be gratefully appreciated.
